Grants for Research and Evaluation on Approaches to Combatting Violence Against Women

Funding Source: Department of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) Deadline: March 25, 2019

Grants of the Research and Evaluation (R&E) Initiative of the Office on Violence Against Women support research and evaluate approaches to combatting domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, and stalking. By generating more knowledge about strategies for serving victims and holding offenders accountable, communities that benefit from this funding will be better equipped to align their work with practices that are known to be effective, and they will be more capable of generating empirical knowledge on the efficacy of new and promising ways of doing things. R&E is designed to support researcher-practitioner partnerships and a broad range of research and evaluation methods, including qualitative, mixed-method, and quasi-experimental, and experimental designs. Because OVW has very limited funds to support research and evaluation, this initiative prioritizes topics for which a stronger evidence base would help OVW grantees use federal funds most effectively. Award periods range from 12 months to 36 months, and maximum total project funding is \$450,000.

Grants for Research and Study in the Fields of Modern Foreign Languages and Area Studies

Funding Agency: Department of Education, Office of Postsecondary Education (OPE): Fulbright-Hays Group Projects Abroad (GPA)

Deadline: March 25, 2019

Grants of the Fulbright-Hays GPA Program help promote, improve, and develop modern foreign languages and area studies at varying levels of education. The program provides opportunities for faculty, teachers, and undergraduate and graduate students to conduct individual and group projects overseas to carry out research and study in the fields of modern foreign languages and area studies. Funding supports either a Fulbright-Hays GPA short-term project or a Fulbright-Hays GPA long-term project.

There are three types of GPA short-term projects:

- 1) seminar projects of four to six weeks in length
- 2) curriculum development projects of four to eight weeks in length that provide
- 3) group research or study projects of three to twelve months

GPA long-term projects are advanced overseas intensive language projects that may be carried out during a full year, an academic year, a semester, a trimester, a quarter, or a summer. GPA long-term projects are designed to take advantage of the opportunities that exist in the foreign country for intensive advanced language training and for using the language while experiencing the culture in the foreign country.

The Foundation emphasizes the support of young scientists at the beginning of their careers and productive senior scientists who wish to move into new fields of interest.

1) Research: Research grants of up to \$225,000 over three years will be awarded to established scientists of all ages working at accredited institutions in the United States.

2) Grants-in-Aid: One-year grants of up to \$30,000 will be awarded to researchers at the assistant professor level who experience difficulty in competing for research funds because they have not yet become firmly established. Grants-in-Aid can also be made to senior scientists.
