Grants offered through SAMHSA's 2016 National Center for Child Traumatic Stress (NCCTS) grant program advance efforts to develop and maintain a collaborative network structure, support resource and policy development and dissemination, and coordinate the network's national child trauma education and training. The NCCTS is part of the National Child Traumatic Stress Initiative (NCTSI). - Basic research to elucidate the mechanisms underlying health literacy and to determine the causal pathways that link health literacy to a behavioral outcome or to identify the underlying components of health literacy, such as cognitive ability or other constructs/skills integral to health literacy.
- Applied research addressing issues pertinent to health literacy practices and research-inpractice.
- Intervention research to develop and test the effectiveness of strategies to improve care and health outcomes for individuals with limited health literacy.
- Intervention research to develop and test the effectiveness of strategies to reduce potentially harmful exposures by improving understanding of the link between environmental exposures and health outcomes for individuals with limited health literacy.
