VISIT BY FILMMAKER CHRISTINE VACHON


Christine Vachon (Carol, Still Alice, Boys Don't Cry, Velvet Goldmine) talked about her career and presented two early films by Todd Haynes on Oct. 24. This event was run in conjunction with FILM 352: Queer Cinema, a course taught by Dr. Roz Sibielski, and was made possible through support of the RIC Foundation and Committee on College Lectures.

The newest member of the English department, JANICE OKOOMIAN, spent four weeks this summer in the Republic of Armenia conducting oral history interviews with feminist activists. It is an exciting time in Armenia, one year after the so-called "Velvet Revolution," a nonviolent mass protest which persuaded a corrupt president to resign. Dr. Okoomian's research will form the basis of a scholarly article about feminism in Armenia. She plans to return there in October of 2020 to present her findings at a conference.

He also presented a paper, "Preaching Apocrypha in Anglo-Saxon England: Historiographic Currents," at the 54th International Congress on Medieval Studies, in Kalamazoo, MI, in May, and participated in a roundtable talk titled "Performative Networks: Tracing the Afterlives of Old English Preaching Texts."

JENNIFER HOLL and BRANDON HAWK co-led the summer Medieval Renaissance Study Abroad trip to London with 23 undergraduate and graduate students, including majors in English, Communication, Elementary Education, and Theatre Performance.

MICHAEL MICHAUD has signed a contract with the Writing across the Curriculum (WAC) Press to publish a monograph on the writing theorist and Pulitzer Prize winner Donald M. Murray. The book will examine Murray's contributions to and legacy within the field of composition and rhetoric.

MAGDA OSTAS has two forthcoming essays: "Thinking with Austen" in the MLA's Approaches to Teaching Jane Austen's Persuasion (ed. Marcia Folsom and John Wiltshire), and "Interiority and Expression in Dickinson's Lyrics," in a volume (ed. Elisabeth Camp) titled *The* Poetry of Emily Dickinson: Philosophical Approaches in the new series Oxford Studies in Philosophy and Literature. She also organized a ten-person seminar for scholars working on fiction, poetry, and film at the annual meeting of the (ACLA) in March at Georgetown University titled "Thinking in Forms: Literature, Philosophy, and the Genres of Our Most Pressing Ouestions."

RUSSELL POTTER spent a September afternoon in a recording studio in Detroit doing an interview for an upcoming episode of the Discovery Channel's "Ocean Mysteries" series, which will focus on new underwater footage of the wrecks of Sir John Franklin's lost Arctic expedition of 1845. The episode will air sometime next spring.

CARRIE SHIPERS published "Graceful Exits: The Endings of Five Grief Memoirs" in *The Writer's Chronicle* (Sep. 2019).
