FALL 2016 ENROLLMENT

## Overall Enrollment

A total of 8,446 students enrolled at Rhode Island College (RIC) for the fall 2016 semester. This number represents a decrease of $0.8 \%$ compared to last fall's headcount enrollment of 8,512 students and is lower than projected enrollment for fall 2016. FTE was essentially unchanged (from 6,935 in fall 2015 to 6,937).

Undergraduate Enrollment
Undergraduate headcount enrollment for fall 2016 is 7,398 , a less than one percentage point decrease from last year. This can be attributed to a smaller number of returning students this fall compared to last. The number of students enrolled in degree programs $(7,224)$ decreased by $0.1 \%$ and non-degree enrollment by $24 \%$, going from 230 to 174 . Despite the decrease in undergraduate headcount, slightly more degree students are taking 16 or more credits; undergraduate FTE enrollment increased from 6,231 in fall 2015 to 6,249 in fall 2016.

## Graduate Enrollment

At 1,048, total graduate headcount enrollment this fall is the lowest it has been in the past ten years. In recent years, decreasing numbers of new students at the graduate level account for the decline. In 2016, 680 students were enrolled as degree students, compared to 703 last fall, a $3.3 \%$ decline. This fall's graduate non-degree enrollment (368) was only a slight increase from last year (363). Graduate FTE was 688 this fall, representing a $2.3 \%$ decrease from last year.

## Enrollment by Degree and FT/PT Status

Undergraduate students comprise 88\% of the college's total student population, with students in degree programs representing $98 \%$ of this number. Graduate students make up the remaining $12 \%$ of the student body, with students in degree programs accounting for about $65 \%$ of the total graduate headcount.


At the undergraduate level, $77 \%$ of the degree candidates are full-time, compared to $21 \%$ of the non-degree students.

Seventy-five percent of the graduate degree students, and 97\% of graduate non-degree students, attend on a part-time basis.

Full-time undergraduate degree candidates are enrolled in an average of 14.4 credits this fall, while part-time degree undergraduates average 7.4 credits. Full-time graduate degree students are enrolled in an average of 11.3 credits, and part-time graduate degree students take an average of 5.3 credits.

## Demographic Characteristics

Eighty-six percent of the undergraduates and graduates at the college are Rhode Island residents.

Roughly two thirds of undergraduate students are female, while one third are male. At the graduate level, $80 \%$ of the college's students are women.

Eighty-seven percent of the full-time undergraduate students are $\mathbf{2 4}$ years of age or younger, compared to $\mathbf{4 4 \%}$ of the part-


The number of minority students enrolled at the college continues to increase; this fall, $30 \%$ of RIC's student body identify as minorities. As the next graph shows, the percentage of minority students at RIC, college wide, has grown by more than ten points over the past decade. Currently, $32 \%$ of undergraduates self-identify as minority students (up from $30 \%$ last fall), and $15 \%$ of graduate students report being a minority student. Hispanics are the largest minority group at RIC, representing $16.2 \%$ of the student body, and the percentage increased by almost two points since last year. An additional $8 \%$ of students identify as Black, $3 \%$ as Asian, $1.7 \%$ as Two or more, $0.4 \%$ as American Indian/Alaskan Native, and 0.1\% as Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander. Sixty-three percent of students identify as White, and $7.4 \%$ of the students did not report their race/ethnicity.


## Enrollment by Program

The undergraduate enrollment by program of choice has remained consistent in recent years. As illustrated in the chart below, Arts \& Sciences makes up 44\% of undergraduate program enrollments, followed by Education, Nursing, Management, and Social Work.

*Both Art Ed and Music Ed are included in the Education total. Intended majors are reported in the desired area of study.

At the graduate level, Education programs account for half of enrollments, but this percentage has been decreasing over time. Social Work enrolls another 29.6\% of graduate students, while the remaining 20.9\% are in Nursing, Arts \& Sciences, and Accounting.
