The Masters in Education (M.Ed.) in TESOL leads to ESL Certification from RIDE.* The M.Ed. is comprised of a **ten-course sequence** *and* a **comprehensive assessment portfolio, which requires enrollment in a 1-credit course**.

TESL 599 Graduate Essay in TESOL (1 credit)**

The comprehensive assessment is usually done concurrently with your final course, but can also be completed separately. (You have three semesters after you finish coursework to complete this portfolio).

**Students who matriculate in Fall 2019 or later must enroll in this onecredit course to complete the portfolio.
