Grants for Research Projects Aimed at Improving the Experiences of College Students Transitioning Into and Through Higher Education.

Funding Source: National Resource Center - Paul F. Fidler Research Grants

Deadline: July 01, 2014

Grants to support and promote research with the potential to have a national impact on student success. Topics may include but are not limited to underrepresented student populations, community colleges, advising, transfer and articulation, career development, and other issues related to college student transitions. The National Resource Center for the First-Year Experience and Students in Transition will award \$5,000 through its Paul P. Fidler Research Grant program for such a project. To be eligible, applicants must be faculty, staff, or graduate students at institutions of higher education in the United States who plan to conduct research related to college student transitions.

Grants for Elimination of Health Disparities in Racial or Ethnic Groups

Funding Source: Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (HHS)

Deadline: July 22, 2014

Grants in this 3-year initiative will award funds to create healthier communities by strengthening existing capacity to implement locally tailored evidence- and practice-based population-based PSE improvement strategies in priority populations experiencing chronic disease disparities and associated risk factors, and supporting implementation, evaluation and dissemination of these strategies. This FOA will also support effective implementation of existing PSE improvements and offers the opportunity for communities to take comprehensive action to address risk factors contributing to the most common and debilitating chronic conditions. The intent of REACH is to also build an evidence base that supports community centered approaches to reducing or eliminating health disparities. Funding Details: \$105 million for 60 awards; Priority goes to programs focused on obesity prevention among African Americans and Native Americans.

Grants for Research to Increase Understanding of the Causes, Manifestations, and Control of Violence and Aggression

Funding Source: Harry Frank Guggenheim Foundation

Deadline: August 01, 2014

Grants for research from any of the natural and social sciences and the humanities that promise to increase understanding of the causes, manifestations, and control of violence and aggression. Highest priority is given to research that can increase understanding and amelioration of urgent problems of violence and aggression in the modern world. Questions that interest the foundation concern violence and aggression in relation to social change, intergroup conflict, war, terrorism, crime, and family relationships, among other subjects. Most awards fall within the range of \$15,000 to \$40,000 per year for one or two years. The foundation awards research grants to individuals (or a few principal investigators at most) for individual projects and does not award grants to institutions for institutional programs.

Grants for History of Art, Conservation and Digital Resources

Grants to Support Music Research and Preservation

Funding Source: Grammy Foundation

Deadline: October 14, 2014 for Letter of Inquiry

Grants each year to organizations and individuals to support efforts that advance the archiving and preservation of the music and recorded sound heritage of the Americas for future generations, and research projects related to the impact of music on the human condition. The research projects grant program awards funding of up to \$20,000 to organizations and individuals working to research the impact of music on the human condition. Priority will be given to projects with strong methodological design as well those designed to address an important research question. The archiving and preservation projects grant program awards grants in support of efforts that advance the archiving and preservation of the music and recorded sound heritage of the Americas. This area has two funding categories: preservation implementation (up to \$20,000) and planning, assessment and/or consultation (up to \$5,000).

Grants for Post-Doctoral Research in Anthropology

Funding Source: Wenner-Gren Foundation

Deadlines: November 01, 2014 and May 01, 2015

Grants are awarded to individuals holding a Ph.D. or equivalent degree to support individual research projects. The program contributes to the Foundation's overall mission to support basic research in anthropology and to ensure that the discipline continues to be a source of vibrant and significant work that furthers our understanding of humanity's cultural and biological origins, development, and variation. The Foundation supports research that demonstrates a clear link to anthropological theory and debates, and promises to make a solid contribution to advancing these ideas. There is no preference for any methodology, research location, or subfield. The Foundation particularly welcomes proposals that employ a comparative perspective, can generate innovative approaches or ideas, and/or integrate two or more subfields. Grants are for research expenses. Applicants can apply regardless of institutional affiliation, country of residence, or nationality. There is no time limit on the duration of the grant and funding may be requested to cover distinct research phases (for example, two summers) if this is part of the research design.
