RECENT & UPCOMING EVENTS

Rosalind Sibielski was selected from the entire faculty to give the keynote address at First-Year Convocation during the first week of classes. In her fantastic, inspiring speech, she described being in exactly the same situation twenty-five years ago as a first-year student at RIC herself. She offered three points of advice that she wished she had known back then: don't be afraid to fail, push to be outside your comfort zone, and never hesitate to seek help from your professors.

On Saturday, 16 September, we welcomed alumnus **Paul Baker** back to RIC for the East-Coast premiere his new short film *The Boxer*. He lives out in Los Angeles and has had the opportunity to work with the likes of Kenneth Branagh, Tom Cruise, Hugh Jackman, Ed O'Neill, Al Pacino, Sam Raimi, Martin Scorsese, Oliver Stone, Susan Sarandon, and fellow RIC alumna Viola Davis. Baker discussed his career and offered advice to students on how to navigate the world of film festivals.

On Wednesday, 20 September, we were delighted to host filmmaker **Remington Smith**, who screened his powerful documentary *Rubbertown*, about the environmentally poisoned residential community beside chemical factories in Louisville, Kentucky. Smith spoke with us

about his career and the making and marketing of this important film.

On Tuesday, 24 October, we are hosting **Paul Thompson**, who works as a video assist up in Toronto. He's worked on over 40 feature films, from Academy Awardwinners such as Room and Life of Pi to big-budget action films such as xXx: The Return of Xander Cage, Suicide Squad, RoboCop (2014), Resident Evil: Afterlife, and The Incredible Hulk (2008) - not to mention cult classics such as Scott Pilgrim vs. the World, Hedwig and the Angry Inch. and Bride of Chucky. In conjunction with the Gothic Melodrama unit in Vincent Bohlinger's course on Melodrama and Action (FILM 352), we're screening Crimson Peak and Thompson will discuss his experiences working on that film plus two others - The Shape of Water and Pacific Rim – with acclaimed director Guillermo del Toro.

In honor of some major film talents the world recently lost, we will be hosting a series of commemorative screenings this semester. For the French acting legend Jeanne Moreau, we will screen Elevator to the Gallows (Louis Malle, 1958), the crime film that made her a star. This film which notably predates Godard's Breathless – is famous for its jazz score by Miles Davis. For the one and only Jerry Lewis, we will be screening *The Nutty* Professor (1963), his very loose adaptation of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde and one of several of his masterpieces in which he was both star and director. In honor of Tobe Hooper we will be screening his landmark horror film The Texas Chainsaw Massacre (1974).

Our Film Studies alumni were well represented among the winners of the

Providence 48-Hour Film Festival this summer. Of the 43 teams that competed, 10 films were chosen for the 'Best Of' screening – and at least 2 of those 10 films had a strong RIC presence. Tom Palleschi ('16), Amanda Bussman ('16), Alex Petrarca ('17), and Ryan Gill ('17) were all involved in making the short film Not for Sale for Climactic Event, a filmmaking studio that Tom cofounded. Not for Sale won for Best Use of Line. Aran Lyster ('15) co-wrote the short film Homestead for Root Beer Studios, which won Best Editing, Best Cinematography, Best Sound Design, Best Acting, and Best Film. Homestead now heads to Filmapalooza 2018 in Hollywood and represents Providence in competition with other city winners from around the world.

We are thrilled to welcome back **Robert Albanese** ('00), who returns to RIC after earning an M.A. in Popular Culture from Bowling Green State University and a Ph.D. in American Studies from the University of Iowa.
